1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Islampur College is affiliated with the University of North Bengal and all the Curricular Aspects are governed by the University guidelines and ordinance. The college prospectus and academic calendar are made following the curriculum framed by the parent university and are displayed on the college website from time to time, before the admission procedure every year. The syllabus is periodically updated by the University. The college has various well-structured processes that enable smooth communication with the university. Various Committees are formed for the Effective Implementation of the curricular aspects. Among such The Teachers' Council plays a vital role along with the various sub-committees of the college and all departments providing directions and regularly monitoring the efficiency throughout the session. Individual teachers after the consultation with the head of the Department, plan out the lesson and course structure in detail, which is later communicated to the concerned authority. Further, the college forms sub-committees which prepare broad guidelines and frameworks to fulfil the requirements of the university. The subcommittee function under the preview of the Teacher Council. . Wherever applicable Field visits /educational trips are regularly organized by several departments according to the curriculum. To enhance the overall development of our students the college organised various co-curricular and extra-curricular events and annual sports meet too is held. The curriculum is reviewed and the proper authority is informed at regular intervals to reflect the advancement of knowledge. All the departments conduct meetings to discuss class assignments, internal assessments, teaching aids, and the use of materials for references before the beginning of each session to discuss and plan the execution of courses for their smooth functioning. Remedial classes are conducted particularly for slow learners to strengthen the learning process. The college takes an active role in building infrastructure and facilities whenever the curriculum is revised/ updated. The teachers are given unconditional support from the college to enhance their subject knowledge by deputing them to attend various workshops, conferences and seminars. Thus, the teachers use various methodologies like blended learning, experimental learning and inquiry-based learning in their course plan to ensure effective delivery of the curriculum. The college conducts internal assessments, weekly class tests and annual examinations to monitor the learning process. Further practical classes are also assessed to monitor the hands-on learning process of students. Students are made to present papers and evaluated through Mentor-mentee programmes and simultaneously the problem of the students is addressed.

Feedback Obtained

Feedback from the students, teachers and employers has been collected anonymously concerning the usefulness of the syllabus and their satisfaction level. The feedback forms were collected and analysed and the information is debated by an advisory committee consisting of senior faculty members for the evolution of the efficiency and success of the students. It is observed that all the students are completely satisfied with the relevant teaching material used for the courses and were satisfied with both the evaluation process at the college and University examination. Interactions of the students with the principal, teachers and office staff are positive and amiable. Some students gave feedback regarding their concerns over the library services, though their overall experience was satisfactory. Their feedback about the campus playground and leisure opportunities suggested that upgradation is needed in these areas. They also requested the upliftment of the infrastructural facilities, the introduction of better ICT facilities and improved library facilities as well. The college management has taken some steps and initiatives based on feedback from students and teachers. The infrastructure of the library was upgraded, and the campus playground was as well. The teaching faculty exhibits a positive outlook towards the student's hard work and efficiency and the employers showed their confidence in the skills of the teachers.

The head of departments seeks to direct them towards the department, the core curriculum, the examination system, career opportunities, and a Q A session to dispel any doubts that students may have at the beginning of an academic session. During each semester or session, faculty members of the department identify weaker students by way of continuous evaluation, and special tutoring classes are routinely organised by mentor. Teachers encourage students to participate in quizzes, presentations, debates, theatre, sports, cultural activities, etc., observed on the college campus. The students are also mentored in extracurricular activities by corresponding teachers during events such as the competitions of the Youth Parliament, science fairs, etc. These activities promote the overall growth of the student like personality, leadership skills, communication skills, etc.

Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) is an important component of the colleges teaching and learning activities. The Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) has been introduced in the institution this year (2018) for all subjects. On account of that, we are at an early stage of initiating and implementing reforms in this system. In order to enhance the quality assessment and further improve the mechanism of internal examination and evaluation, adhering to the University guidelines, a committee consisting of senior teachers and Heads of the Departments of the Institution, has been formed. The college undergoes a series of Oral, and written test, assignment-based tests, group discussions, power point presentation are undertaken to evaluate the merit of the students. Aside from this, continuous internal assessment is also conducted for the students adopting the annual examination pattern by taking class tests, group discussions.

An academic calendar is prepared by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in consultation with the Teacher-in-Charge before the commencement of the new academic session. The calendar is prepared in such a way as to keep in mind the two different systems adopted in the college, namely the Annual examination system and the CBCS system. The calendar guides the college in scheduling all the academic and cocurricular activities, such as teaching, internal assessment, sports activities, cultural activities, etc., to carry out smoothly, timely, and efficiently. Islampur College has set procedures and policies for the maintenance and use of physical, academic, and support facilities such laboratories, libraries, sports facilities, IT infrastructure, etc., The governing body of this institution allocates appropriate funds to cover the management of the academic and physical facilities. 1. Maintenance of the Laboratory: Islampur College has four operational laboratories belonging to the departments of Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and Geography. The entire maintenance of the laboratory is monitored and supervised by the head of the concerned department. Each department keeps track of the equipment that is currently in stock. Heads of departments submit the requisition for purchasing new equipment to the Teacher-in-Charge. The requirements are met in accordance with the availability of funds. 2. Library: The library committee and governing body are responsible for purchasing and procuring books, manuscripts, and other materials in accordance with suggestions made by the departments of the college in order to maintain the libraries infrastructure and facilities. The library has a wide collection of text and reference books, and the figure is around 16,000. Apart from that we keep 10 journals of national importance that caters the need of our students across several departments. The allocated library staff member arranges all the

books in proper order and routinely cleans and maintains the shelves and stack rooms. The procedure for conserving and preserving books is done on a routine basis. 3. Maintenance of the sport facilities: Islampur College believes in the philosophy of 'A sound mind in a sound body'. Hence, the college tries to inculcate and promote the culture of physical and mental soundness among its peers. As a part of this vision, the college has constructed an indoor stadium for indoor game activities and the college is in possession of a huge sports ground spread across 16 acres of area that facilitates outdoor sports activities like cricket, football, volleyball, badminton, discus throw, etc. Further, the college annually hosts sports' day so that the students could participate in various sport events. The college Sports Committee in coordination with the Governing Body purchases sport articles and necessary sport equipment time to time according to the need of the students. 4. Computer: Recognizing the importance of Technology in education, Islampur College is well-equipped with IT facilities. IT facilities with Wi-Fi were introduced first-time in the college on 1st June 2007. After that, it was updated several times. In the year 2014, two types of Broad Band connection (i.e., Alliance and BSNL) with Wi-Fi in nature were introduced only for the offices, Labs, and Library. In the year 2018, when the CBCS education system was effective, the IT facilities were upgraded to spread all over the college like an umbrella. At that period internal exam became fully digitalized. 5. Classroom Infrastructure: Within its limited infrastructure and resources, Islampur College endeavors to cater huge number of students. Though the college is not in possession of adequate number of classrooms, its vision is to expand the number of classrooms in future.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1. The institution strongly discourages the use of plastic in the campus. Awareness campaigns against the use of plastic have been undertaken to enlighten the students about the dangers of environmental pollution due to the abuse of plastic. Flex materials are strictly banned in the campus, and students and staffs are always encouraged to use natural and bio-degradable materials for banners and backdrops. 2. The institution tries to maintain a green campus and undertakes afforestation activities regularly. Every year the college celebrates World Environment Day on 5th June during which a large number of saplings are planted and distributed in the locality. 3. Proper waste disposal and recycling norms are established and strictly followed in the college campus. So, in the next year, the college seeks to Implement Structural Repairs to the existing Building and Electrical fixtures and if possible to create some additional class rooms by optimally utilizing the available space. 8. The college seeks to upgrade the Canteen Facility and Canteen Kiosk, for the Students and the Staff Members. 9. The college also wants to give thrust to and create awareness about Cleanliness among students, and to identify hidden talent among the students for various sports and cultural activities.
